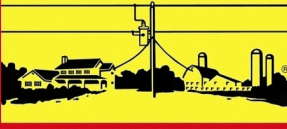

Extreme cold may impact bills



With the frigid air that we have experienced lately, Mecklenburg Electric Cooperative wants to remind you that colder temperatures can bring higher than expected electric bills. January's temperatures dropped into the low teens, and even the single digits, on several occasions causing heating units to run constantly.

On average, January is usually the coldest month of the year – so please keep this in mind as you open your February electric bill, which reflects January consumption. However, if you feel that your energy use is too extreme - even considering the cold temperatures - please give us a call. Our representatives are always on hand to help you isolate issues that may be causing you to use more electricity than normal.

Tip of the Month

Fighting winter chills? A crackling fire in the hearth warms the house, but don't let it heat up your electric bill. To cool energy costs, keep the fireplace damper closed when not in use. Caulk around the fireplace hearth. Double up on wood-earned warmth by lowering the thermostat setting to between 50 degrees and 55 degrees Fahrenheit. Learn more at www.energysaver.gov.
